

105 INERRANCY

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"The Bible is filled with contradictions!" You have probably heard someone make this claim about the Bible. What do they mean by contradictions? Most of the time, critics assume there are contradictions in the Bible because they do not understand the purpose of each individual book. Each book has its own way of telling the truth, and when we read them as God intended, we realize that what is perceived as a contradiction is "tension" that can be explained.

- The Bible clearly claims to be inerrant and supports its claim with evidence.
